Over the past 10 years - and including the dinner auction (netted \$11,350) the total from 'fundraising' efforts such as the recent basket raffle netted \$14,980. Over the same period the total in donations, and yes, much of it memorial donations, was \$11,345 - enough to keep us going... but not something we want to depend on. We need a real fundraiser soon!

With February 20th looming in the horizon, it is time to submit the application to participate in this unique program. Our exchange is a two part program: we match each selected student with a student selected by our Sister City counterparts, The two students spend much of the summer together - half here and half in the Sister City. It also has become very much a family centered program as it involves the whole family.

Since it's inception in 1977 - the first exchange with Yao - 114 high school students have had the opportunity of spending part of their summer in one of our Sister Cities, and an equal number of students from our Sister Cities have visited here.

Back in 1952 Billie decided that the Eastside needed its own travel agency - and thus the beginning of

Overlake Travel, the travel agency she owned and worked at until retiring in 2000. No surprise then that when BSCA looked at organizing their first delegation visits to Japan, it was Billie who, not only took charge of planning but also, along with husband Wib, became one of the early BSCA members - and someone who could always be relied on to help.

Even as age and health issues made it difficult for them to participate in all BSCA events, both Billie and Wib still made it to the Yao meetings and to picnics and Holiday parties.

Probably *Florence Metcalf* was closest to Billie of all BSCA members – she writes: It was during the last few months before Billie died that I really got to intimately know her. We laughed over childhood memories - hers on a Midwest farm and mine in the



Orient. I think husband Wib was the one who looked forward most to my visits because it meant a BIG bowl of chocolate ice cream would shortly appear...

I know she loved her many Bellevue Sister City friends. She had traveled all over the world with them on delegation visits. She never missed a Yao meeting at Hugh Burleson's home or later at mine. You could always depend on Billie - she would usually arrive with a cake or pie in her hand!!. It was useless to say "Please don't bring anything" She was always a great help at picnics and dinners - arriving early and staying until the last person was ready to leave and the last bag of garbage was disposed of in the proper container!

A year ago Billie was still walking three miles a day, up and down the hills around Tam O Shanter. She looked so healthy full of vim and vigor and almost daily visiting her church friends especially those in retirement homes. She was always helping others...VISITING, BAKING.

Then one day she mentioned a severe back pain....and suddenly problems from past reappeared. All too soon they recognized the time had come when additional care was needed. All too soon they had moved to the Woodinville Creekside Center, where daily assistance could be received as needed. I enjoyed two lunches with them in the dining room.... Then the phone call I will never forget!!

Now I enjoy Billie Franklins beautiful "peacock" green" Chinese rug. I look at every day in my living room, think of my dear friend throughout the day and treasure our brief friendship.

My New Years message... Cherish the love and happy memories you have of this life, especially of family and friends. Many memories can be remembered.....but not relived. Yes, mine are slowly slipping away!! Florence Metcalf
