Washington Responds to the Disaster in Japan Dr. Charles Aanenson, CEO, Peace Winds America



Just as BSCA reached out to Japan back at the time of the earthquake in Kobe, after this major earthquake rocked Japan, we looked at ways to again help our to our friends. How best to help? Your board voted to contribute \$1,000—but where? And when the Highland Center decided to hold its Zumba for Japan fundraiser they asked the same question. The Japan-America Society of the State of Washington had several suggestions—the one that appealed most to us was Peace Winds of America and its counterpart in Japan—Peace Winds Japan.

Peace Winds America was founded in 2008 by Dr. Charles Aanenson, who brings over 30 years of experience in the field of international aid and development. During his post at the U.S. Embassy in Tokyo,

Dr. Aanenson identified a critical gap in disaster preparedness and humanitarian assistance in

the Asia Pacific. While many organizations provide disaster relief in this region, he saw a great need for better planning and collaboration to reduce the impact of natural disasters and to promote long-term sustainability for affected populations. Dr. Aanenson founded PWA to address these urgent needs.

Dr. Aanenson arrived in Tokyo on March 15th to support Peace Winds disaster relief operations and will be returning to Japan shortly—we look forward to is sharing his experiences with us.

President's Message - stories we like ...

I recently heard from Barb Surdi, mother of Connor Surdi our exchange student to Yao a few years ago and now a senior at Newport High. She was asking as to the best way to send money most directly to the disaster victims in Japan.

Apparently she and Connor were to have gone to Japan in mid-March to look into a universities there; but the great earthquake and tsunamis beached that plan. Instead, just days after the earthquake, Connor had devised little stickers appealing for aid and prayers for the victims. Within the first 24 hours, he had raised \$1,200 selling the stickers for 5 cents each. After the first month, he has raised \$<u>15,000</u> selling the stickers, key chains and T-shirts!

They heard about the Zumba event at Bellevue's Highland Community Center and arranged to have a table there selling some more of these items. So, just as our BSCA donation to Japan and the Zumba event funds, Connor's hoard will also go to Peace Winds America, an affiliate of Peace Winds Japan, which was sending truck convoys of relief supplies into the devastated northeastern area as soon as roads and bridges were passable and is still in there further helping the displaced residents (such as by building bathhouses for those still in refugee centers in the area's schools).

Connor's interest in Japan and Japanese culture had been sparked long before by interaction with Japanese exchange students attending Bellevue College whom his parents hosted for 18 years. He went to Yao after his freshman year, for during his middle-school years he had been taking Japanese language at Bellevue High and so already had three years of high-school Japanese under his belt. Connor was a special hit in Yao in part because he had played catch with Ichiro when he and his dad were down in Arizona to visit the Mariners during the off season. Back home he stopped his mother just in time from washing the sneakers he wore. We heard he had those sneakers hanging in his bedroom.

Connor hopes to attend college in Tokyo. His goal beyond college? Well, he's an avid photog-rapher and hopes to get a job with Canon Cameras. Hail, Connor!

Yao Lions Send us Their Student Debaters

On March 20, many months of communications between BSCA and the Yao Lions Club brought culmination to the Lions' project to link their fall debate contest to the Yao-Bellevue sister city affiliation. Last summer, the Lions Club had developed plans to hold an English language debate for Yao for high school students in October and reward the top three debaters with an all-expenses-paid trip to Bellevue during their spring break. BSCA's Yao Committee agreed to cooperate by lining up home stays here for the students and planning some events for the three students.

As it turned out, excellent tips from Eureka Lim's son (a

senior at Newport High School), led us to contact Newport's very active debate club and its dynamic debate coach, John Julian. Mr. Julian jumped at the opportunity to enlist the club in this project and continued to do much of the "heavy lifting" on this project for us—lining up host families—our thanks to John and Jana Julian, Leslie Lu and Jane Su, and Kenny and Faye Wu— and arranging for a debate and other interaction between the Newport club and the visiting students.

In Bellevue March 20~April 1, the Yao students had several get-togethers with their Newport counterparts and on March 25 met at the high school auditorium to debate the issue of whether school uniforms should be required. Due to the Japanese students' fairly limited fluency in English, they made prepared statements rather than ad-libbing their arguments; but the debate was enjoyed by all attending—the high school debate students, host parents and BSCA members alike.

As part of the event Yao Lions president lkeda came to Bellevue for two days, was treated to some sightseeing around Bellevue by BSCA president Hugh Burleson and attended the debate at Newport High. Mr. lkeda brought with him generous honoraria for the host families, and relished the pizza party we held at the school after the debate. And as for the Newport HS debate students—some asked if there will be another exchange such as this next year... maybe... and maybe we might even try for some of our other Sister City High School debate teams.
