It's a Small World...

Recently Elise Lalor, our travel agent at Rainier World Travel, was among a group invited by the Japanese Tourism Agency to tour Japan in order to assure the invited travel agents that recovery was well on its way, especially in the southern part of Japan that was spared the worst of the aftermath of the earthquake.

Their tour included Osaka, Kyoto and Kagoshima – the latter with its continually erupting volcano and the hot springs one of the highlights of the tour. As Elise chatted with the tour guide she found that this lady was very familiar with Seattle having attended UW, and also, not only knew about the Bellevue-Yao Sister City connection, but had herself been part of a visiting delegation!

And in Hualien...

As over the past few days we watched hurricane Irene make it way up the east coast of the US leaving devastation in its wake—much the same was happening on the other side of the world... a typhoon that flooded homes, roads and farmland in Taiwan with more than 20 inches of rain left the island Monday and headed to southeastern China.

Typhoon Nanmadol stayed over Taiwan for only a few hours and was weaker than when it pummeled the Philippines, where at least 16 people died and another eight were missing. We have not yet heard of major damage from our friends in Hualien and hope they all weathered it safely..



Liepaja Special School project has broken ground!

It has been over a year since Dace Kreismane completed the plans for the Liepaja Special School grounds, a busy time for her as she searched for funding. The estimate for 'our' playground as first planned was 19,125Ls (about \$35,000) - our Ann Knofel fund only \$7,000—quite a bit short.

European Union funding—due to the financial crisis—was not forthcoming. A few other options also ended as dead ends. Along with Zaiga Philips she met with the Liepaja Lions club and they are willing to support the project.

In the meantime, loath to wait too much longer, it was decided to go ahead and start by preparing the playground area and installing the first pieces of equipment. As of mid-August the playground area has been cleared and filled with sand which will eventually be covered with the projected rubber surfacing. Two of the smaller pieces of equipment have been installed – funding for the large play structure—the estimate for it is around \$14,000- is the next goal—we have about \$900 left.
