# Remembering Karlis Bets

As so many of his contemporaries, Karlis led a checkered life—during WWII he found himself in Germany, then as a refugee in England. He emigrating to Canada, and at age 26, as an electronic communication specialist he got a job with an American firm—at the North Pole. Then came 10 years of working for American firms in Europe. He eventually moved to Seattle—and was part of the Bellevue-Liepaja sister city work group.

Says Cheryl Kuhn, then Sister City liaison, "Karlis called or visited Bellevue City Hall nearly every day in the 1990-92 timeframe -- not only to promote the sister city affiliation, but also to obtain information for Liepaja

on establishing up-to-date technology. While visiting Liepaja, he would even keep in touch with Bellevue by calling from aboard ships in the harbor. Here in the U.S., I know he also called on high tech firms to request donations and, at one point, did obtain a donation of ArcInfo (GIS mapping) software for the City of Liepaja. I consider him one of the patriots of Latvian independence."

And when in 1994 he went to visit his native city—Liepaja—his three sisters and falmily... he decided to stay. He met Olga and made his home there. Along with his nephew Anrdis Grigis he started several businesses including the beer brewery "LIVU alus". Karlis passed away April 13, 2013.

# Bellevue-Hualien Celebrate 30 years



On the morning of July 29th, the celebrations began. First the rite of "awakening" the guardian lions—bringing the assembled dignitaries and audience to full alert, the Fire Chief lit a long string of firecrackers—which are traditional at major Chinese events. Then, with the chief of the Lion Dancers supervising, Mayor Lee used a brush and fresh ginger-root juice to anoint the eyes, mouth, paws and head of the male Fu Dog. Madame Zhang, did the same for the female. Immediately, eight dancers in four large and colorful "lion" costumes "awoke" and rose to perform, while drums and gongs spurred them on.

There followed speeches—Mayor Lee, Director General Andy Chin of the Taiwan Economic & Cultural Office (TECO) in Seattle and Madame Zhang. And after flowers for the lady and photo-taking, all proceeded to the

City Hall concourse for lunch, Chinese style while entertained with music and dances.

The entertainment continued after lunch — Children and the master of the local Shaolin Martial Arts School, fashion modeling by the Forever Charming Chinese Modeling School, solo performances on Chinese instruments by members of the Seattle Chinese Orchestra, folk dancing by the Seattle folk Dance Group, a dance and taiko drumming performance by Tacoma's Okinawa Club and dancing and percussion by the Sin Moung Percussion Arts Group of Ko-



rea. All in all, a veritable festival of Chinese culture!



The Hualien delegation, accompanied by Bang Hwang, then proceeded to Microsoft for brief tour of original campus and a tour of its Digi-Pen institute, where staff take a 4-year course on creating computer games. And on to an evening at Top Gun Restaurant in Factoria, where all enjoyed a fabulous meal (was it ten courses?), co-hosted by the City, BSCA, TECO and some from the local Chinese community. It was hugely successful and convivial.

Their final day, with Eureka Lim and Bang as guides, the Hualien

delegation toured the Everett Boeing plant and visited some Seat-

tle highlights— Pike street Market and the 'flying fish'- and were suitably impressed by the Chihuly Garden and Glass exhibit at the Seattle Center.



We all owe a huge THANK YOU to Eureka Lim for her well-executed planning of much of this activity. Al-



so to Bellevue City's Art Director, Mary Pat Byrne and to Tom Boydell City's Economic Development chief, both of whom spent endless hours planning and working on the details of this visit. Of course, to Mayor Conrad Lee, who
