

Tom Boydell recently spent his vacation time in Hualien at the invitation from the Mayor of Hualien and his wife. He delivered greetings to our sister city from the Bellevue City Council and BSCA. Tom met with Hualien Mayor and city representatives as well as BSCA friends. He also met the members of the Hualien delegation who visited Bellevue last summer including Hualien Mayors wife—center in picture. Besides Hualien itself, he visited Taroko Gorge—a favorite place from past delegation visits.

Tom's impressions of his visit— I loved the people of Taiwan.

I was impressed by how generous hearted everyone is. And impressed by how much the Bellevue relationship means to them. I really saw the deeply profound value of sister cities.

After six years with the Department of Economic Development at City of Bellevue, part of that time as the liaison between the city and BSCA, he is leaving for a position with Greater China USA.

During the year **Bill Bockman** spent in Japan he had the opportunity to bike one of the of the world's most remarkable cycleways - along the **Shimanami Kaido**. It took Bill 3 days to cover the 90 mile route over the Seto Inland Sea that connects Japan's main island of Honshu to the island of Shikoku passing over six small islands. The dedicated cycle route follows a series of architecturally imaginative suspension bridges including the Kurushima-Kaikyo Bridge which is the longest series of suspension spans in the world totaling 2.49 miles. The route is extremely scenic and the design features to make it bicycle accessible make it almost assuredly the most expensive bike path in the world.

Brad Miyake Travels to Japan

Bellevue acting city manager Brad Miyake recently spent a week in Japan as one of this year's 10 Japanese American delegates selected to participate in the Japanese American Leadership Delegation (JALD) program. Established in 2000, each year JALD a selects a group of Japanese American leaders from across the U.S. to travel to Japan and meet with Japanese business, government, academic, non-profit and cultural leaders. This also allows Japanese leaders to gain a greater understanding of multi-cultural America through their interaction with a diverse group of Japanese Americans. This year's participants spent two days in Fukuoka in the Kyushu region meeting with Governor Hiroshi Ogawa and other government leaders before heading to Tokyo, where they met government officials, had discussions with leaders across many fields, visited Japan's National Diet (the country's legislature), met princess Takamado, a member of the Japanese royal family and Prime Minister Shinzo Abe.

Not all was work – Brad also explored the dense city of Tokyo surprised by the "organized chaos" and cleanliness. He visited the fish market, rode the bullet train and ate traditional Japanese ramen – a favorite. Brad is a third generation Japanese American but this was his first visit to Japan – and a week to experience the pull of his cultural roots.

Brad – we at BSCA hope you won't wait too long for your next visit to Japan and join our upcoming delegation visit to Yao and Hulien.

AND—the City Council selected Brad to be the new City Manager.

Delegation visit to our Asian Sister Cities
