The project added 600 feet of pedestrian trail to the Botanical Garden's current trail system. Come early and explore the new trails!

From Your President

The Quiet Power of Sister Cities

Amid the tumult and intense emotions of national politics and international crises, the public—people in general—and national governments may easily overlook the impact and importance of year-to-year sister city activities. Like the brick-by-brick building of a house, the cumulative effects of friendly exchanges between cities and towns here and abroad build relationships that tend often not to attract the attention of local and national officials too often distracted by short-term crises and disputes.

This concept has gradually dawned on me—from the early 1960s as I served in Japan, India and Korea in my Foreign Service assignments and after I retired and became active at the "domestic" end of such exchanges as we have seen the number of US/foreign city affiliations mushroom in the last few decades. The volume of such exchanges could now be called a *national movement*, not mere scattered activities or programs.

As such, all of us who are involved and dedicated to the sister-city movement must assure that the individual affiliations we are involved in attain the effectiveness and staying power they need and deserve. I believe they are contributing to world peace at least as much as do international treaties, defense alliances and other forms of nation-to-nation interchange. Yes, it is comparatively low key work and mostly underrated by national leaders and the uninvolved public. But, is it not telling at the grass roots level a way to assure that anything at all worthwhile grows and thrives?

So, once again I urge that each BSCA member become actively involved and contribute whatever skills and service you can. Perhaps starting with your potluck dish at our July 12th picnic.


