First a look at our accomplishments—and the event that stands out is the July delegation visit from Hualien and the long awaited 'awakening' of the Foo Dogs. Partnering with the City, TECO and with the encouragement from Bellevue Mayor Conrad Lee and the support of the local Taiwanese community this was a real community celebration—a great way to commemorate 30 years of friendship.

We observed 20 years of friendship between Bellevue and Kladno with speaker Wayne Jehlik, founder and president of the Center for Czech Education and Culture. And we were present at the official opening of the Honorary Consulate of the Czech Republic in Seattle and Wayne's official confirmation as Honorary Consul for Washington State. September saw a small delegation, led by Bellevue Deputy Mayor Jennifer Robertson, head to our European sister cities. We again enjoyed the red carpet treatment, were updated on events in both cities, visited social and historic places and consolidated our friendships.

And there were the usual membership gatherings—our Summer Picnic and the Holiday luncheon—the latter this year also a venue for presenting our retiring president, Hugh Burleson, commendations from the City as well as from SCI for his many years of service.

Last and not least, BSCA for the first time participated in the Celebration of the Lunar New Year at Westminster Chapel in Bellevue—and we hope to be there again next year.

One regret—there was no student exchange last summer... but we're looking to it this summer.

Also in the planning stages is a delegation visit to our Asian sister cities—we have a preliminary go ahead from the City Council and will be working on dates and itineraries.

For the past year Silva had been suffering from a serious illness – she passed away on Dec. 31. Silva spent many years involved in Latvian politics serving several terms in the Saima (Latvian parliament) part of the time as Minister of Education and Science. Returning to Liepaja in 2005 she was elected to the City Council serving as Deputy Mayor with education as one of her areas for the last several years.

The BSCA booth featured a small part of Florence Metcalf's *hashioki* (chopstick holders) collection as well as other items highlighting our sister city Yao,



A huge thank you to those who spent the afternoon at the booth—our president Gregg Schrader and friend Abigail, past president Hugh Burleson and secretary Gary Winchester, to Inta Gotelli for creating the poster and to Florence Metcalf for sharing her Japanese treasures.

This is not the first time that Florence has shared her collection of *hashioki* with us— a much larger part of her collection was featured in our booth at the Japanese Festival last September at Bellevue College, and those visiting her home can see the display that takes up most of a living room wall.

Florence grew up in Japan in a missionary family and in 1946 during the Occupation, shortly after the surrender of Japan and the end of WWII, was working in Tokyo at GHQ - Translation Section. Through her work there she met a Japanese woman who had lost most of her possessions during the bombing of that city. They spent many hours together sipping tea, sharing memories and dreams of the future. One day her new friend gently placed a small Noritaki bone china ob-



ject in Florence's hand – a narcissus with green leaves. *Nani mo nai desu ga… dozo…* she whispered – "this is so very small but please accept this as a token of my friendship"... and so started Florence's interest in the symbolic and folklore *hashioki* and a collection which now numbers over 850 many of which she has described in a book she shared with us.



And from HUALIEN It had been a long time since Eureka and Vern Lim had been in Hualien during the Chinese Lunar New Year holidays. They celebrated with family, ate traditional Lunar New year foods and also received a red envelope (an new year tradition with money inside) from Eureka's sister.

Hualien is a tourist town and streets and many famous places were crowded. A special visit was an exhibit at the local museum of a table of delicacy banquet dinner set all make of Hualien Jade.

While they were there, Eureka also had an opportunity to have lunch with the mayor of Hualien, the mayor's wife and his staff. He

would like to invite BSCA come to visit Hualien next year. This year he is busy campaigning for his re-election which will held in Dec. 2014. We wish him best on his election campaign.

RIGA 2014 - European Capital of Culture

The idea to each year designate a European city as the Capital of Culture originated in 1985 as a way to bring Europeans closer together by highlighting the richness and diversity of European cultures and to raise awareness of their common history and values. It has since been a catalyst for the cultural development and the transformation of the city as well as having a beneficial socio-economic and development impact. The first cities to be so named were Athens, Florence, Amsterdam, Berlin and Paris. Since then one or more cities have shared a year of cultural events with their citizens and visitors – and this year it is Riga, Latvia that is one of two to do so. Riga, Latvia was officially unveiled as a 2014 European Capital of Culture on January 17 to 19, 2014, with one of the main events being a

human chain transferring books from hand to hand, from the old National Library of Latvia building to the new "Gaismas Pils" (Palace of Light) National Library building on January 18. Over 1400 people lined the streets in freezing weather as they handed the plastic wrapped books down the chain – through Old town and across the bridge—stopping often for pictures. Among those participating was the president, several deputies and many representatives of foreign embassies including
