Celebrate the 25th Anniversary of the Baltic Way - Saturday, October 25th

The Annual St. Martin's Eve has for many years been a fun fundraiser sponsored by the Lithuanian, Latvian and Estonian communities to support the Baltic Studies Program at the University of Washington. This year instead of the usual auction, the evening will be dedicated to celebrating the 600km long human chain that stretched from Tallinn to Riga to Vilnius on August 23, 1989—a peaceful demonstration protesting once again the secret Molotov-Ribbentrop pact between Stalin and Hitler that was signed 50 years earlier at the beginning of World War II. The end of the 1980's was a time of many demonstrations by the Baltic peoples against Soviet occupation—but this was one event that stood out in history and included all three Baltic states. Each year, the Young Artists and Authors Showcase encourages youth from around the globe to express the mission of Sister Cities International through original artwork and literature. All students must submit their work based on a designated theme that is announced each year. Artwork is sent from member cities to Washington, D.C. where a panel of judges selects the winners based on originality, composition, and theme interpretation.

2015 Theme: Connecting Communities for Peace and Prosperity

Sister Cities International aims to promote peace through mutual respect, understanding, and cooperation – one individual, one community at a time. This year's theme, *Connecting Communities for Peace and Prosperity*, celebrates Sister Cities International's mission.

Sister Cities International founder President Dwight D. Eisenhower reasoned that, by becoming friends, people of different cultures could celebrate and appreciate differences. If people connect across national boundaries and get to know each other, their mutual respect and understanding can transform diplomatic relations and foster peace and prosperity. Artists and authors from around the world are encouraged to use their imagination. What is your vision of peace? How does connecting globally allow you and your community to prosper?

Participants must be between 13 and 18 years of age at the time of the 2015 deadline and from a duespaying member of Sister Cities International. <u>Deadline to submit entries is May 1, 2015.</u>

Delegation Visit to our Asian Sister Cities—Hualien, Taiwan and Yao, Japan

We are still waiting for confirmation of the dates for our upcoming delegation visit to Hualien, Taiwan and Yao, Japan, but in the meantime - a quick look at some of the high lights in past delegations.

But first, in this age, when so many various tours are available to ever more exotic places – in what way does a delegation visit differ – other than the destination is our sister cities? Back in 1939, on the eve of WWII, Stalin and Hitler sent their foreign ministers to negotiate a treaty which affected the fate of Europe and the entire world. This secret pact, its existence denied for decades, signed by Molotov and Ribbentrop, divided the spheres of influence of the USSR and Germany in Europe and eventually led to the Soviet occupation of the three Baltic States - Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania.

The Baltic Way—25th Anniversary

Fifty years later, growing dissatisfaction in many of the countries occupied by the Soviet Union, led

to demonstrations and demand for freedom, among these a demand that the secret clauses of the Molotov-Ribbentrop pact be recognized. In the Baltics, this culminated on August 23, 1989, the 50th anniversary of the signing of this pact—in the Baltic Way— when more than a million people joined hands to create a 600 km long human chain from the foot of Toompea in Tallinn to the foot of the Gediminas Tower in Vilnius, crossing Riga and the River Daugava on its wayand impressive act of non-violent protest and solidarity.





Since then, this event

has been celebrated each anniversary – this year marking 25 years. Events not only in the Baltic republics, but in communities all over the world marked this date with various events – from commemorative coins, photo exhibits, even a bicycle tour over the original course. In Chicago, sister city to Vilnius in Lithuania, one of the larger events in the US brought together people from all three countries for festivities and speeches – including the Chicago mayor and congressmen.



Liepaja Special School Update

Slower than we had anticipated and hoped, the Ann Knofel playground is slowly taking shape.
