Thank You, Mitzi, for the Many Years

Up until just a few years ago, no BSCA function was complete without Mitzie Hashiguchi busy doing whatever was needed. Over the years she held several offices—back when she was often seen in charge of a box of name tags, keeping track of the membership among several other jobs. She was our historian, documenting BSCA activities in the numerous photo albums.

By the time Mitzie and her siblings were born, her immigrant Japanese parents were growing the strawberries the Bellevue area was famous for - to this day there is an annual Strawberry festival here. Then came WWII and the

Hashiguchis, along with their Japanese neighbors, were forced to leave on short notice for internment camps. They eventually returned to the Bellevue area

and started life anew. Until she retired in 1982 Mitzi worked as Assistant Supervisor of Elementary School Lunches.

When in 1969 Yao became Bellevue's first sister city many locals joined this newly formed group, what eventually became the Bellevue Sister Cities Association, anticipating enriching experiences and travel opportunities between US and Japan—among them, Mitzie, as well as many other local Japanese. And what a find she was! She was always so

willing to help - and she tried to

make sure there were always strawberries and blueberries available on arrival for our Yao guests. Over the years Mitzie traveled on many delegation visits to Yao as a representative and "dignitary" from BSCA often acting as the interpreter since very few Americans spoke fluent Japanese. Along with other Yao members she could always be found at the BSCA booth at the Aki Matsuri —with Florence and Alice Rasmussen at left.

She is presently living in Seattle with other retirees from Japan and daily enjoying rice and miso soup! Florence Metcalf has been a frequent visitor and found her cheerful and happy when she last saw her, on her 94th birthday. – a belated Happy Birthday, Mitzie.


And a huge thank you to Gregg Schrader and Abigail Westbrook for 'holding down the fort' and chatting with the visitors stopping by.

Celebrating Lunar New Year in Hualien

Again this year Eureka and Vern Lim, along with Eureka's sister June, headed Hualien to greet the Chinese New Year with family. But before the celebration can begin, spring cleaning is a must – no sweeping is allowed on the first day of Chinese New Year as it is believed that you will be sweeping out all your good luck or family fortune.



The eve of the New Year is a time for family gatherings – the most important day and often the time for elaborate dinners or maybe a steamboat dinner - a big pot of soup placed in the middle of the



The first day of the New Year should be started by consuming a bowl of sweet dessert called "tong sui" (syrupy sweet drink) in Cantonese. It symbolizes starting the year off sweet and

pleasant. To assure good luck everyone is encouraged to speak only good and nice things – using inappropriate language is considered bad luck. The lucky children can get away with their misbehavior – crying on New Year's day is considered unlucky so parents avoid upsetting their children. And all debts should have been repaid nor should there be any lending on this day as it is believed that it will put you in debt for the whole year.

On the second day, the elder generation who stayed at home to welcome visiting relatives on the first day, will now visit their friends and relatives. A favorite pastime during this festive season of 15 days are card games. The Chinese also like to set off lots of fireworks and firecrackers during this time.



The last day of celebration of Chinese New Year is Lantern Festival with lanterns soaring in the sky for peace and joy – and a time to enjoy sesame sweet rice balls.

Read My Pins: The Madeleine Albright Collection March 13 - June 7, 2015

U.S. Secretary of State Madeleine Albright famously used to make poignant diplomatic statements through her selection of the jewelry she wore. Her use of jewelry as a form of nonverbal communication began after Saddam Hussein's press referred to her as an



"unparalleled serpent." The then U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations responded by wearing a golden snake brooch to her next meeting with Iraqi officials. This provocative act of adornment led to a career-long relationship between Albright's diplomatic point of view and her jewelry. "I found that jewelry had become part of my personal diplomatic arsenal," Secretary Albright said. "While President George H.W. Bush had been known for saying 'Read my lips,' I began urging colleagues and reporters to 'Read my pins.'"

The collection of over 200 works on view span more than a century of jewelry design and include fascinating pieces from across the globe selected by Albright for their symbolic, rather than material, value. The exhibition explores the stories behind these brooches as well as their historical and artistic significance highlighting jewelry's ability to communicate in a nonverbal yet powerfully articulate way.
