# **Welcome Back our Asian Delegation**



### **MAJESTIC ISLAND - 1950s TAIWAN**

Note: this film was shot in anamorphic widescreen. An "unsqueezed" version posted in the near term.

This historic film presents "Majestic Island," a 1960s color film that takes it viewer to Taiwan. "Until the end of World War II these people were headhunters. But now they hunt for tourists," says the narrator at mark 01:11. We see tribesmen perform a ritualistic dance (mark 01:33) and aerial views of farmland, later getting a ground view of Taiwanese working in fields or tending to their flocks. The tranquility stands in stark contrast to the Nike missiles shown at mark 04:00 that guard the coast. After seeing a review of Taiwanese troops and their air force the film introduces the viewer to some of the fighter pilots. At mark 07:15 a family sets off for the capital, Taipei, to see their oldest son who is serving in the armed forces. The viewer also takes a look at some of the island's universities and steel-making plants, as well as a fishing village on the Pacific shoreline (mark 10:10). Beginning at mark 12:54 the film shows a presentation of Chinese opera by young students and a trip down Green Lake with a Dragon Boat armada. We watch as the family bids farewell to their eldest son (mark 16:20) and board a bus for the return trip to their village.

We encourage viewers to add comments and, especially, to provide additional information about our videos by adding a comment! See something interesting? Tell people what it is and what they can see by writing something for example: "01:00:12:00 -- President Roosevelt is seen meeting with Winston Churchill at the Quebec Conference."

This film is part of the Periscope Film LLC archive, one of the largest historic military, transportation, and aviation stock footage collections in the USA. Entirely film backed, this material is available for licensing in 24p HD, 2k and 4k.

## Roland A Strolis 1938-2017



The Liepaja committee is saddened to lose another long time member. Since Roland was born in Liepaja, it is not surprising that he was among the first to support Liepaja's affiliation with Bellevue. He was an active member for many years, often attending BSCA events with camera in hand.

The Strolis family, much like so many other Latvians, left their country in 1944 to escape the Soviet occupation. The end of WWII saw them in Germany from where in 1950 they emigrated to the US, settling in the Seattle area. Roland attended Queen Anne High School and the University of Washington, after graduation joining many other Latvians at the Boeing Company where he worked until his retirement in 1998.

When in 2000 Liepaja marked it's 375<sup>th</sup> birth-day, Roland was an official delegate to the celebration. The city of Liepaja was redoing the Rose Square at the center of the city and had requested from each sister city a plaque with its city logo – these were placed around the border of the rose garden, each facing in the direction of its city. Roland had the pleasure of present-

ing the plaque, as well as reading the official statement



from the city of Bellevue - at right with city officials, the president of Latvia and delegates from Liepaja's sister cities.

As many of us, when visiting Liepaja, Roland made a point to stop at the Rose Square and have his picture taken next to the Bellevue plaque.



After the collapse of the Soviet Union, Roland often visited Latvia and spent time with family in Liepaja. During their first trip in 1998, while visiting his family plot in the Liepaja cemetery, he turned to his wife, Vivian, and expressed a wish to be buried there when the time came... sadly it has come way too soon, and Vivian is in the process of getting the necessary paperwork to bring his urn to Liepaja - hoping to do so by Roland's birthday - July 3rd.

# Trjedeksnītis Spring Folkdance Concert

Trjedeksnītis is Seattle's premier Latvian folk dance ensemble. It was formed some 50 years ago, dancers of all ages participate at Latvian community events as well as locally. They have performed at the Song and Dace Festivals in in the US and in Riga and will be performing at the Latvian Song and Dance Festival in Baltimore in July.
