### Seasonal "CHABANA" Exhibition Invitation to Japanese Tea Ceremony Flower Arrangement Sunday, September 10th - 10am-4pm **Bellevue Botanical Garden**

In Japan there are various flower arranging traditions- in some myriad flowers are used, in others, only a few flowers are selected. Chabana, the flower arrangement for the tea ceremony, uses a minimum number of flowers, even as few as one or two.

The Sasebo Branch of To-cha Koten Seminar was established in 2000 to deepen the understanding and appreciation of Chabana with the objective both to study Chabana and to share this unique living tradition with others. Sasebo Branch participates in workshops with the grand master of To-cha Koten Seminar and hosts one annual exhibition - this year's exhibition in Bellevue.

#### State of Washington to host the 2018 Japan/America Grassroots Summit September 18-25, 2018

The Japan-America Grassroots Summit is an annual large-scale meeting of Japanese and American citizens, held alternately in Japan and America. For about a week the hosts share their homes and the unique features of their communities with their guests. More than 100 people usually participate as guests, enjoying sight-seeing, cultural activities, welcome and closing ceremonies, and staying with a host family.


The Grassroots Summit celebrates the historic friendship between Nakahama Manjiro and Captain William Whitfield. Whitfield rescued the marooned Manjiro in 1841 and shared his own home with him. Later, Manjiro's rare command of English and salutary experience in America became pivotal to the Japan/US relationship after Perry's arrival in 1853.

The grassroots Summit is unique in that its focus is on homesays for the guests - after a day of welcome and opening ceremonies the guests meet their homestay hosts with whom they will spend the next four days, then followed by closing ceremonies and a farewell program.

The Japan-America Society of the State of Washington has approached the City of Bellevue and BSCA to participate in the Summit. This would involve recruiting volunteers to organize the activities as well as finding host families for the Japanese guests. This is an opportunity for us to work with the JASSW and other WA cities but our involvement will depend on volunteers and host families - are you interested to participate?

## Liepaja Committee helps Erlands attend Kursa

Earlier this year we received a request to help Erlands Griezitis with the expenses to attend the West Coast Latvian High School summer camp in Shelton. Since back in 1973. Kursa has given Latvian high school students the opportunity to connect with their cultural heritage through Latvian language, cultural activities, thus also creating life-long friendships. During the four year program. besides language and history, various activities are available to the students, and all participate in music and folk dance. While most of the students come from the west coast, those coming from other states and especially Latvia add to the diversity of experiences to be shared. Last year Erlands, whose home town is Liepaja, was one of these, and he was determined to continue in the program, sharing his experiences and learning from his colleagues. http://kursa.rklic.org/en/

Kladno, Czech Republic - Sophie Sceats shares her experiences with Lenka Cernohorska from Kladno:

My exchange was really fun. In Bellevue, I took Lenka to see the highlights of Seattle, including the Space Needle, the Chihuly Museum, and the MoPop. We went biking, paddle boarding, canoeing, and swimming. She came to my school, and met many of my friends. We had lots of different food, visiting the Crossroads food court a couple of times.

In Kladno, I experienced Czech food, Czech culture, and saw some famous monuments. We visited the Prague Zoo, Karlstejn castle, the Kladno Aqua-

park, a park for rescue birds, Charles Bridge, the Prague planetarium, and a festival in Ho-

lasovice, near the Austrian and German borders. We made Czech fruit dumplings, mushroom goulash out if mushrooms we picked in the forest, and ate lots of ice cream.

I learned some Czech, and spent time with Lenka's relatives on several overnight trips. We blew glass, went on a treetop walkway, and did some shopping. My favorite part was spending time with Lenka; going geocaching, painting our nails, and watching Netflix together. I enjoyed meeting her family, and seeing lots of dogs all over the Czech Republic. Lenka and I became very good friends, and I hope that we will see each other sometime in the future.



#### Yao, Japan. Blake Ostrem shares some of his experiences with Mana Kasa and her family:

We visited the annual Yao Summer Festival at a Buddhist Temple. This celebration includes amazing food trucks, carnival games, and religious rituals. I was able to partake in a Mikoshi carrying ritual where a group of men carry and parade the shrine around the festival for two hours. Afterwards, I attended a party at the Yao volunteer fire department with my host parents.

We visited the Osaka castle, one of Japan's most famous landmarks. I hiked here with Mana after we went to the peace museum, which had a lot of information of World War 2. While walking from the peace museum to the castle we stopped at a food truck and bought some green tea ice cream.

I stayed at a hotel in Okinawa for five days with my host family. While the beach was beautiful, it was almost too hot for comfort at 100 degrees F with high humidity. We enjoyed a lot of traditional Okinawan food. The most interesting part of Okinawa is that more than 1/3 of the island is a U.S. military base.


### **Summer Picnics 2017**
